Burglary Suspect Arrested

In June, a male suspect entered a secured lot at a car dealership and went through four unlocked vehicles before entering the mechanics shop, where he stole \$480 worth of tools. The suspect returned the following day and entered two unlocked vehicles before being chased off by employees. Video surveillance captured both incidents.

In July, the same suspect broke into a victim's vehicle at the victim's residence and took a purse. The supect then used the victim's credit cards at seven different locations, totaling \$890. Surveillance video was able to capture the theft and the suspect using the stolen credit cards.

Then, in August, the suspect entered another vehicle at another residence and stole a wallet. The suspect used the victim's credit cards at seven locations, totaling \$664.

The cases were assigned to our Professional Staff Investigators (PSIs). Information was shared with both ODE and ODM Zebra officers and the suspect was eventually located, wearing a shirt stolen from the car dealership.

He was arrested on nine felony charges, including burglary, theft of a credit card, and fraudulent use of a credit card. The suspect also had an outstanding felony warrant for auto theft.

This case is a good reminder never to leave valuables in your vehicle.

ODE Bike Patrols

ODE has several officers who are bicycle certified. Bike patrols are a valuable alternative to traditional patrol responses in marked units, as bicycles are not as

conspicuous and can patrol areas that are difficult to access. ODE implements monthly bike deployments to work areas in our division that are experiencing criminal activity.

ODE bike officers worked the area of East Broadway between Kolb and Wilmot and the area around East 22nd and Wilmot. During the deployment, ODE bike officers address crimes such as open-air narcotics use, trespassing, and other criminal behaviors.

Multiple people were contacted and arrested for trespassing at businesses in these areas, and one was arrested on a felony warrant.

Bears





If not friend, why friend shaped?

ODE has had two separate incidents involving bears in our community.

On September 14th, officers were flagged down near St. Joseph's Hospital about a bear sighting. Officers circulated the area and located the bear in a tree. Arizona Game and Fish Department officers responded and were able to tranquilize the bear, who was relocated to a much more suitable habitat.

A few days later, officers responded to reports of a bear running in the neighborhoods near Valencia and Houghton. Arizona Game and Fish and TPD officers circulated the area, but were not able to locate the bear.

According to Arizona Game and Fish, the bears were moving out of their traditional habitats in search of food, and younger bears look for new home territories. Game and Fish also said the drought has been a big factor in the number of bear sightings in and around Tucson.

Crime Prevention Tip



TPD works every day to reduce gun violence – by vigorously pursuing enforcement against prohibited possessors, treating non-fatal shooting investigations – even with uncooperative victims – as high priorities, and working diligently to solve homicides. TPD also works to connect at-risk youth with job, educational, housing, addiction, and mental health services.

These approaches are proving effective, but what other factors might reduce gun violence?

In 2018, the Rand Corporation established <u>The National Collaborative on Gun Violence Research</u> with funding from Arnold Ventures. Over 5 years, NCGVR funded 57 research projects on reducing gun violence.
